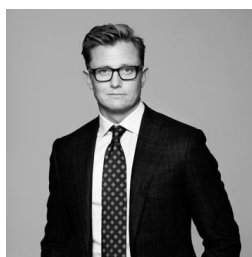

David Budtz Pedersen is professor of science communication and science studies at Department of Communication and Psychology, Aalborg University. He is the author and co-author of several studies and policy reports on research management and research impact and has published widely on issues related to interdisciplinary research funding, evaluation and leadership. He has served as scientific adviser to the Danish and European academic policy on interdisciplinarity and innovation, among other positions.

Asa Nakano is in charge of designing and creating Center for Enhancing Next-Generation Research and conducting surveys with policymakers and government officials, particularly in EU countries. Asa also lectures on program design methods for academic support professionals in Japan and abroad, including training curriculums for research administrators at Kyoto University and the University of Tokyo.

Prior to joining Kyoto University, she was the Director of Museum-University Strategy for the Kyoto University of Art. The Agency for Cultural Affairs in Japan also selected her as a promising artist, and she worked as a First-class Licensed Architect on international projects between Japan and Spain.
